Registering & Voting in Michigan

You must register at least 30 days before the election. This gives the clerk time to process the forms and send you a Voter Identification Card.

The registration deadline to vote in the November general election is Tuesday, October 11, 2016.

The General Election is Tuesday, November 8, 2016.

to register:

Before anyone can vote in Michigan or National elections, they must register. This is an easy process.

- You can register to vote for federal, state and local elections by filling out and mailing in the accompanied form to your local clerk.
- If you register by mail, you must vote in person at your assigned precinct the first time you vote.
- You can also register by visiting your county, city or township clerk's office.
- You also have the option of going to any Secretary of State branch office located throughout the state.

A mail in voter registration form can be obtained by contacting your county or local clerk's office. You can also obtain them from an organization like your local union. Remember, if you register by mail you must vote in person at your assigned precinct the first time you vote.

have you moved since you last voted?

- Whenever you move to a new city or township, you must re-register to vote.
- If you move within a city or township, you must update your address. This can be handled through your local clerk, at your polling place on election day, at a Secretary of State branch office or by mail.

to vote:

- To vote, simply appear at your assigned polling place on election day. The polls are open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m.
- All Voter Identification Cards list a precinct number; some provide the polling place location.

If you do not receive a Voter Identification Card within three (3) weeks after registering, contact your city or township clerk's office to confirm your registration status.
